

EPISTLE LESSON FOR TODAY

Romans 5:1-10

BRETHREN:

Therefore, having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom also we have access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God.

And not only that, but we also glory in tribulations, knowing that tribulation produces perseverance; and perseverance, character; and character, hope.

Now hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us. For when we were still without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly.

For scarcely for a righteous man will one die; yet perhaps for a good man someone would even dare to die. But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Much more then, having now been justified by His blood, we shall be saved from wrath through Him. For if when we were enemies we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life.

GOSPEL LESSON FOR TODAY

Matthew 6:22-33

Let us Attend!

The lamp of the body is the eye. If therefore your eye is good, your whole body will be full of light. But if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in you is darkness,

how great is that darkness! No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be loyal to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon.

Therefore I say to you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink; nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing?

Look at the birds of the air, for they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? Which of you by worrying can add one cubit to his stature? So why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin; and yet I say to you that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these.

Now if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will He not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? Therefore do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For after all these things the Gentiles seek. For your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things.

But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you.



Also, when using a Rule of Prayer, we must be flexible and do what we can and do it attentively and consistently. ST. GEORGE ORTHODOX CHURCH WEEKLY EDUCATION CORNER

THE FEAST OF ST. HYACINTH JULY 3

Saint Hyacinth, a native of Caesarea in Cappadocia, was raised in a Christian family. The emperor Trajan made the boy his "cubicularius" (chamberlain), unaware that he was a secret Christian.

One day, while the emperor and his entourage were offering sacrifice to idols, the young Hyacinth remained at the palace, shut himself up in a small room, and prayed fervently to the Lord Jesus Christ. One of the servants overheard him praying and denounced him to the emperor. He said that although Hyacinth was entrusted with an imperial position, he did not honor the Roman gods, and was secretly praying to Christ.

Hyacinth was brought to trial before Trajan, who tried to persuade him to deny Christ and sacrifice to the deaf and dumb idols, but the holy martyr remained steadfast and declared that he was a Christian. He was whipped and thrown into prison, where the only food given to him was what had already been offered to the idols. They hoped that he would be overcome with hunger and thirst and eat it. Saint Hyacinth did not eat the food, and he died after thirty-eight days. When they came to torture him again, they found his dead body.

The jailer saw two angels in the cell. One covered the saint's body with his own garment, and the other placed a crown of glory on his head.

The twelve-year-old Hyacinth suffered for Christ in the year 108 in the city of Rome. Later, the saint's relics were transferred to Caesarea.

Saints Diomedes, Eulampius, Asclepiodotus, and Golinduc also suffered with Saint Hyacinth.

SERMON FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. Glory to Jesus Christ! Glory Forever!

As human beings, we are created by God with both soul and body, and neither soul nor body can fully and appropriately exist and live without the other. Our life does not consist of one or the other. If we say, "I am a Christian," we are not a Christian only spiritually speaking, but rather we are a Christian in our whole life: everything about our life. As a person we have a body and we have a soul. While, as a Christian and in the Church, we many, many times deal with and hear teachings about our spiritual life, we would not serve much of a profound God if he did not also address our physical life, because they are all intertwined together. We cannot live without this body. We simply cannot, and we cannot live without living within this body, because God will raise it to eternal life.

Therefore, in the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus speaks of both. We heard in the third antiphon, from the Sermon on the Mount, those very familiar words to us: "Blessed are the poor *in spirit*, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness. Blessed are the merciful." These are *spiritual* qualities. But later, in the same sermon, in the same talk, Our Lord says, "No one can serve two masters. Do not worry about your life. Do not be anxious." Those, my dear brothers and sisters, are about our physical existence.

Our Lord begins the gospel reading by giving this distinction. He says, "The lamp of the body is the eye. If therefore your eye is good, your

whole body will be full of light, but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness." We are creatures who have an eye gate. Even though we have a mind which makes us human—it gives us the higher faculties—we don't simply move from thing to thing instinctively like an animal. We have a mind, a rational mind that is able to think through problems, but we also have an eye. That eye sees things, and when we see *things*, it can lead to the sin of envy.

In other words, the eye can lead us to envy. It can lead us to covetousness. "Oh, I wish I had this or I wish I had that?—" The eye is given to us to see the reality of life as God has presented to us, and that's precisely why, in the Church, as it has been from the beginning, we surround ourselves with images because Our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ is the image of God. When we see Him, we see God. Therefore, we have the image, the icon, of Him. We have the icon of His Beloved Mother – The Most Holy Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary, we have the icon of The Most Holy Saints, and we see the reality of life the way it is supposed to be.

For Orthodox Christians, we don't necessarily close our eyes when we pray, because we've *seen* the true light, we've *seen* Christ, we *see* the image of God, we *see* the image of God in each other. He has become incarnate. He's taken on human flesh, and He has taken this body and this material world, and He is trying to restore it to what it was always meant to be, which was to have communion with God. Every material thing in this world is given to us to have communion with God.

If we use our eye to see the material things to feed our own desires, to long for things that we don't need for our salvation, to long for things that don't belong to us, that we don't need to exist... we just heap on ourselves more and more and more. When we hear a commercial like this one—"You deserve a break today," right? "Oh, I deserve a break today! I'm going to go to McDonald's, because I deserve a break today!" Right? It's all about *me*. And the more I have, the more I feel good about myself, and the fact of the matter is: the more I have, the more I want and really the less I feel good about myself. That's the irony of it all.

We have to ask ourselves, "When is 'enough' enough?" So that's why he begins this gospel reading with the *eye*, because the eye leads us to envy. And then Our Lord Jesus Christ just lays it out. "No one can serve two masters. You cannot serve God and mammon." Because you will spend all of your time serving one or the other, but not both. Not both. We will be blinded by the desire for wealth, and even though the Scriptures are very clear about this that we must use all things for The Glory of God. What it says is, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." In other words, it can be done, but it's really tough. We really have to stay focused on God.

The desire for things will destroy us if we don't get control of it. That's why Jesus says these words that are very difficult for some of us, me included, because He just says it like there's a switch that we just "turn it off." We all struggle with this reality. Our Lord goes on to say: "Therefore I say to you: Do not worry. Don't be anxious." It's really hard. What we find out is, when we are worrier and when we are anxious about things, it's because we want to control everything and we can't control everything. What's going to happen is going to happen.

Specifically in this gospel reading, Our Lord says, "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, about your body, what you will put on. Is your life not more than food and the body not more than clothing?" This is not our life. Our life should not be focused on what we put on or what we put in our mouth, but about our life in the way that we relate to God and in the way that we relate to other people.

Our heavenly Father knows that we need all these things—but seek *first* the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you." In other words, we *are* made up of a body and a soul, and we are not called to live as though we don't have a body, because that body *is* great and it is created by God in His Image and Likeness and above all – our bodies are The Temple of The Holy Spirit. The physical life that we live in this world is real. The needs that we have will be provided for by God, because His promise to us –"Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things will be added to you!" What we *need*, not what you want. What we need.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, our eye can lead us to covet. It can lead us to envy. We can be blinded by the desires of this world! But also, the eye can lead us to God! Lead us to follow Christ towards salvation! The eye is the lamp of the body. If the light in us is good, if we see good things in this life, our body will be full of light, but if we see our own desires, if we see only what's in it for me, then our body and our life is full of darkness. And Our Lord Jesus Christ says: "How great is that darkness! Like the dead of night."

We do have a choice in this matter. Our life as Orthodox Christians is not just a spiritual matter. It is our life. We are body and soul. Let us make good choices. Let us want and desire the things that are needed for our life. Let us not be led by envy. Let us be led by love and by mercy.

Let us continue to walk in the way of Our Lord by living, proclaiming, and sharing His Gospel Message of love, peace, forgiveness, and salvation so that others can come to know Christ, Love Christ, Live Christ, and Follow Christ and give all Glory, Honor, and Worship to The One True Living God Who loves us more than we love ourselves – to Him be all Glory of the Father, and the Son, and he Holy Spirit always, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen. Glory to Jesus Christ! Glory Forever!

Third Sunday after Pentecost The Eye is the Lamp of the Body

Matthew 6:22-33

From The Explanation of the Gospel of St. Matthew by Blessed Theophylact, Archbishop of Ochrid and Bulgaria

22-23. The eye is the lamp of the body: if therefore thine eye be sound, thy whole body shall be full of light. But if thine eye be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that darkness.

This means, if you fill your mind with worries over money, you have extinguished the lamp and darkened your soul. Just as the eye that is sound, or "healthy" brings light to the body, and the eye that is evil, or "diseased" brings darkness, so also does the state of the mind affect the soul. If the mind is blinded by these worries, it is cast into darkness; then the soul becomes dark, and how much more so the body as well?

- **24. No man can serve two lords.** What He means is this: no man can serve two lords who command things that are opposed to each other. Such lords are God and mammon. We make the devil our lord when we make the belly our god. But by nature and in truth God is the Lord, and mammon is unrighteousness. For either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon. Do you see that it is not possible for a rich man and unrighteous man to serve God? His love of money drives him away from God.
- 25. For this reason I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on.

For this reason: for what reason? Because concern over money drives a man away from God. The soul does not eat, for it is bodiless, but Jesus said this according to the common use of the word (1) For it is obvious that the soul does not consent to remain in a body if the flesh is not fed. Jesus does not forbid us to work, but rather He forbids us to give ourselves over entirely to our cares and to neglect God. Hence we must

work for our livelihood while not neglecting the soul. **Is not life more than food, and the body more than raiment?** This means: He gave us much greater things, life itself, and formed our bodies. Will He not give us food and clothing?

26. Behold the birds of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much more than they?

Although He could have given the example of Elijah and John the Baptist, instead He mentions the birds in order to shame us, for we are even more witless than these creatures. God feeds them by having given them the instinctive knowledge for finding food.

27. Which of you by taking thought can add one cubit unto his stature?

This means: Even if you take the utmost care, you can do nothing if God does not will it. Why then do you drive yourself to exhaustion with futile worries?

28-29. And why take ye thought for raiment? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin: and yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these.

He shames us not only by the birds, which lack reason, but also by the lilies, that wither. If God adorned the lilies in such a manner, without any necessity to do so, how much more will He fulfill our own need for clothing? He shows that though you go to great lengths, you are not able to be adorned as beautifully as the lilies. Even Solomon the most wise and splendid, with all his kingdom at his disposal, could not array himself in such a manner.

30. Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is cast into the oven, shall He not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith?

We learn from this that we ought not to be concerned with beautifying ourselves, for our adornments wither like the fading flowers. Therefore one who beautifies himself is like grass. But you, He says, are creatures endowed with reason, whom God fashioned with both soul and body. Those "of little faith" are all those who concern themselves with such thoughts. If they had perfect faith in God, they would not give such anxious thoughts to these things.

31-32. Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? For after all these things do the Gentiles seek.

He does not forbid us to eat, but to say, What shall we eat? The rich say in the evening, "What shall we eat tomorrow?" Luxury and excess are what He forbids.

32-33. For your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.

The kingdom of God is the enjoyment of all that is good. This comes through righteousness. To him who seeks after spiritual things God in His generosity adds what is needed for physical life.

THE BLESSING OF VEHICLES:

To Honor The Feast of the Prophet Elias (Elijah)

SUNDAY JULY 10, 2022

After his ministry on earth, the Prophet Elias (Elijah) was taken up to heaven in a fiery chariot. He is therefore known as the patron saint of vehicles, reminding us that we must struggle to manifest holiness in our lives, especially when we travel.
